The New York Telephone Co. became suspicious when it examined records from a computer that monitors Information calls. Some Informa-tion calls, the computer showed, were taking as long as 100 minutes, as compared with a normal time of one to three minutes.

The telephone company noted that many of the calls were originating in Nassau County and Cahn's office was contacted. Investigation, in cooperation with the State Police, showed that other calls of the same type were originating in the Potsdam N.Y., area, and this led police to the Clarkson and Potsdam operations, Cahn said.

Police said that the calls had been made back

and forth among the blue-box owners, and to other points in the country, for months. There was no precise information available from the telephone illegal callers.
