Sorry, Wrong Voiceprint

When police raided a Hollywood recording studio last March they found "blue boxes" on the telephones and rock musician Ike Turner behind a desk. Turner and three others were charged with cheating the phone company on long distance calls by using the boxes - devices which permit calls to be dialed anywhere in the country without being recorded by the phone company's automatic billing equipment.

The prime evidence: Voiceprints recorded when the phone lines were tapped during the investigation preceding the raid. The werdict: For Turner, not guilty. An Ingleside, Calif., judge ruled this week that Turner's voice was not among those on

Rock musician Ike Turner was cleared yesterday in Inglewood, Calif., of a charge of possessing a device used to avoid paying for telephone calls. The misdemeanor charges against Turner and two others were dismissed on grounds that their voices did not show up on voice prints taken during the investigation. A fourth defendant was convicted. Turner, husband of singer Tina Turner, and three others were arrested at a recording studio March 26 for allegedly using studio telephones equipped with "blue boxes" which bypass the phone company's automatic billing equipment.

court in Inglewood, Calif., has cleared Ike Turner, the rock musician, of charges that he used a "blue box" device to cheat the telephone company of toll call revenues.
