Fraudulent tax returns were submitted by nearly half of 318 Northern California federal income tax preparers surveyed by Internal Revenue Service agents, an IRS official says.

Raymond F. Harless, North-rn California IRS director Convicted Of ern California IRS director. told a news conference Thursday that agents posing as taxpayer clients went to the return preparers with a common situation, reporting \$9,121.30 total income for a husband and wife. This included \$1,600 income for the wife working as a waitress and \$1,000 in tips.
